CATHOLICS GET CHANCE TO CELEBRATE, THINK ABOUT MARY WITH NEW FEAST DAY

The Catholic Church doesn't often add new celebrations to its pretty full liturgical calendar, but this year's new feast day, Mary, Mother of the Church on May 21, has Catholics gearing up to mark the day or at least think a little more about Mary.

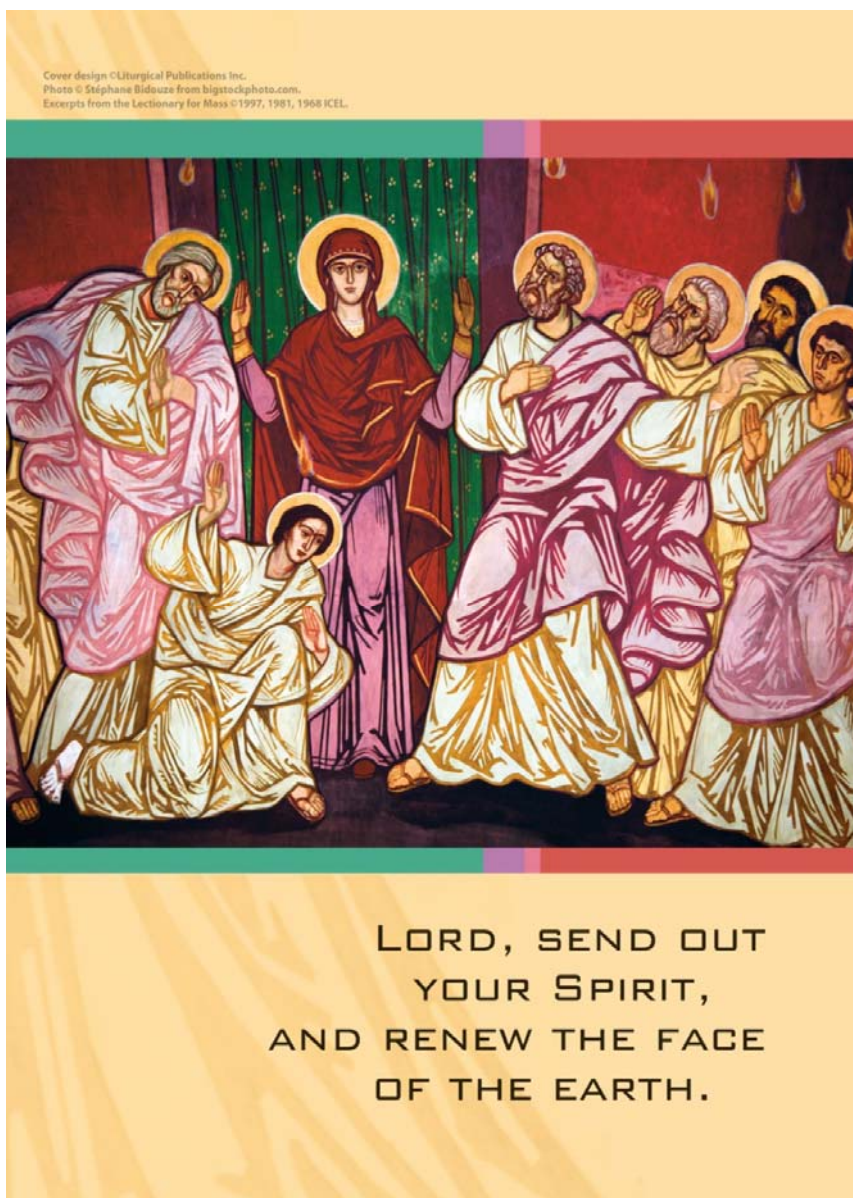
The new feast day, which will be celebrated annually the day after Pentecost, was announced in a March 3 decree by the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Sacraments. The decree said the pope approved the celebration because he thought it might "encourage the growth of the maternal sense of the church in the pastors, religious and faithful, as well as a growth of genuine Marian piety."

"Gaining a renewed and deeper understanding of Mary's nurturing and caring side is something the church, especially in today's climate, could certainly use," said Fr. Chuck Barthel, pastor of Mary, Mother of the Church in south St. Louis.

When Father Barthel thinks about another day to honor Mary, he said he is reminded of the hospital ministry he did as a seminarian when a patient who was Episcopalian asked him if it was OK if she prayed to the Blessed Mother.

She said her reason for doing this, which the priest has never forgotten years later, was: "Sometimes you just need a woman to talk to."

PEOPLE OF GOD

The sinful spirit of the world divides and separates people; the Spirit of Christ unites people and brings them together. It was the sinful spirit of the world that caused the people of Babel to become confused and scattered. The Spirit of Christ, on the other hand, enabled people to understand those who were different from them.

What would happen if we carried the Spirit of Christ into the sinful structures of the world? What if we brought the Spirit of Christ into the dead bones of our broken relationships among races and sexes and cultures and regions of the world? Wouldn't those dead bones rise to life, as in Ezekiel's prophecy, if we were able to breathe into them the Spirit of Christ!

Paul wrote to the Romans that "all creation groans and is in agony." We long for unity, and so we pray that the Spirit may "unite the races and nations on earth and disperse the divisions of word and tongue." We Christians "have been given to drink of the one Spirit," whom the sequence names "Father of the poor." When we shall have done away with the human divisions represented by the poor, then, indeed, the Spirit shall have renewed the face of the earth, and we shall be able to say to people, as Jesus did, "Peace be with you."

All men are called to be part of this catholic unity of the People of God, a unity which is harbinger of the universal peace it promotes. And there belong to it or are related to it in various ways, the Catholic faithful as well as all who believe in Christ, and indeed the whole of mankind. For all [persons] are called to salvation by the grace of God.

LOVE ONE ANOTHER

As many of you know, my nephew Christopher died two weeks ago of a drug overdose at the age of 32. Christopher was a wonderful young man. He came from a good home with two incredibly loving parents and a little sister who adored him. He also held an MBA from University of Dayton and had achieved a number of successes for one so young. But the disease of addiction affected the last few years of Chris' life and sadly it led to his death, as it has for so many young people in Saint Louis County and across the nation.

A natural question arose for me and for others during this difficult time: where was God in all of this? For the last year of Chris' life he was clean and happy, so why did this tragedy happen, and why now? Where was God? I know that was the question running through my mind as I drove up to his house to anoint him.

The answer was not long in coming. After anointing Chris, my sister, brother-in-law, and I stepped outside the house for the medical examiner to do his work. A young Latino man stood across the street talking on a cell phone and watching the scene. I was irritated that anyone would be so insensitive as to stare at my family at such a time. He went back into his house and reappeared a few moments later with rosaries in his hand. He came across the street and handed one to each of us and quietly told us how sorry he was. He said that he and his family would be praying for us. And God was present, powerfully present, in that small act of kindness.

God continued to reach out to my sister and brother-in-law over the next few days, as family, friends, neighbors and co-workers circled the wagons. They brought food and comfort and laughter with them. Each one of them hugged my sister and brother-in-law and cried. They pitched in on chores to give them time to greet guests. And they poured into the church on Saturday to celebrate Chris' life and entrust him to God.

That is where God is during the worst moments of our lives. I don't believe for a minute that it was God's will that Chris died when he did, and I don't believe God refused to intervene at significant moments over the past three years of addiction. God did intervene, through incredibly loving people who helped Chris many times, who gave Chris what he needed to have a good final year of life. God was present at every moment because Chris was loved by so many people. I firmly believe Chris is in Heaven. And I have witnessed how God has been present to my sister and brother-in-law and the rest of Chris' family through so many acts of kindness from friends and strangers. They have been bowled over by it, and so have I.

We are put on this earth to love one another. I am writing this article on the Feast of Saint Matthias, and the Gospel of the day is from John 15: “This is my commandment: love one another as I love you. No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends.” When we love one another, we make God present. Everything else we do as a Church, be it the sacraments, or building projects, or parish festivals, all of them are centered on the love God has for us and the love we are to have for each other. I am more certain of that than ever. Where love is, God is. Let us take very seriously Jesus' commandment to love one another, and to demonstrate that love through concrete acts of kindness.

Perfect Love Story
Ending: Widower
Donates Life
Insurance to Save
Others From
Medical Debt



DALAS, TX - Danny and Betty Roberson were married for sixteen years before she finally passed away in February – but their love is still changing the world for the better, even after she is gone. Betty eventually succumbed to a tumor that had continued to grow in her body despite enduring months of chemotherapy. While she was receiving treatment, Danny had also been diagnosed with cancer in the form of a tumor that was in his face.

The devoted husband refused to get treatment for the tumor so they could use all of their finances to take care of Betty's cancer. After Betty's passing, however, Danny finally allowed himself to get treatment for his facial tumor. He is now recovering from a successful surgery that had the tumor removed.

Danny recently donated \$10,000 of Betty's life insurance payout to the charity RIP Medical Debt, a nonprofit that buys out people's medical debt for pennies on the dollar. This means that Danny's donation will forgive about \$1 million in medical debt – and he says that it's all courtesy of Betty. "When they go out and see that RIP medical envelope in their mail box, I know God is blessing them and I know Betty may have had a little bit to do with that,"
